



Is a powerfully addictive stimulant drug made from the leaves of the coca plant native to South America. Although healthcare providers can use it for valid medical purposes such as local anesthesia for some surgeries, possession of more than 2.5 grams of cocaine is illegal. As a street drug, cocaine looks like a white crystal powder. Street dealers often bulk it up with additives like cornstarch, talcum powder, or flour to increase profits. They may also combine it with other drugs (often with fentanyl).

Is the failure of the pumping action of the heart, resulting in loss of consciousness, and later an absence of - breathing and pulse: a medical emergency requiring immediate resuscitative treatment, if possible.

Is a synthetic opiate drug which is a powerful painkiller and tranquillizer. It is found in 80% of all street drugs.

Is a concentrated and highly potent methamphetamine with dangerous side effects. It is used medically in the form of crystalline hydrochloride, but it is often used illicitly.

Is a severe mental disorder in which thoughts and emotions are so impaired that contact is lost with external reality.

Is a white, odourless, bitter, highly addictive narcotic crystalline compound that is derived from morphine.







It is a time of intense difficulty or danger.

It is a pure, potent form of heroin originating in Southeast Asia.

The chemical 3,4-methylenedioxy-methamphetamine (MOMA) is a synthetic drug that alters mood and perception (awareness of surrounding objects and conditions). It is chemically similar to both stimulants and hallucinogens, producing feelings of increased energy, pleasure, emotional warmth, and distorted sensory and time perception.

It is a synthetic amphetamine used illicitly for its mood-enhancing and hallucinogenic properties.

This large-animal veterinary drug is an ultra-potent synthetic opioid that is up to 100 times more potent than fentanyl and is not approved for use in humans in any capacity.
